The teacher stood on the other side of the fence with the girl's brother and told her that she had to go to her own playground. The girl asked if her brother could come with her to her playground. But that wasn't allowed either.

That experience planted a seed of desire for creating a world where all people truly have the same opportunities. Today, Diana Pastora Carson is a teacher, author, disability rights advocate, and a consultant and speaker specializing in inclusion, and diversity as it relates to disability. And just as she did as a child, Diana seeks to include her brother, and everyone, in our world.

Joaquin Carson has survived segregated education, social isolation, and lack of understanding amidst his communication attempts. The experience of being disabled by his environment, more than his autism, continues to inspire the work of his sister. Joaquin has lived in a state institution twice in his lifetime due to mistaken judgments about his personhood and lack of dignifying responses to his existence.

Diana combines these experiences along with her experiences as an educator to help teachers, administrators, students, and other community members realize the great possibilities that exist for us all.




